1. Bengaluru Tunnel Road: Urban Mobility, Parks and Rule of Law

GS-II Governance & Federalism | GS-III Urban Infrastructure | Indian Express, 31 Aug 2026

Why in News

Two new Karnataka laws have triggered controversy because they affect park-land use and urban-mobility approvals linked to Bengaluru's proposed 16.75-km north-south tunnel road between Hebbal and Silk Board.

Background / Context

- Large urban transport projects often involve a conflict among mobility, ecology, fiscal prudence and statutory procedure.
- Urban transport planning must be integrated with land use, public transport, storm-water systems and non-motorised mobility.
- Retrospective legal validation can raise rule-of-law concerns if it appears to regularise decisions after the fact.

Prelims + Mains Perspective

- **Prelims:** Bengaluru lies on the Mysore Plateau at relatively high elevation; Hebbal is in the north and Silk Board in the south-east corridor.
- **Mains:** Mega road infrastructure may induce more private-vehicle use if not integrated with mass transit.

2. Typhoid Control: Vaccination, Diagnostics and AMR

GS-II Health | GS-III Science & Technology | Indian Express opinion, 31 Aug 2026

Why in News

A fresh public-health editorial argues that rising typhoid should be addressed through vaccination, better diagnostics and antimicrobial stewardship rather than empirical antibiotic use.

Background / Context

- Typhoid is caused mainly by Salmonella Typhi and spreads through contaminated food and water.
- A single Widal test is not reliable enough to confirm acute typhoid in endemic settings; blood culture remains the conventional reference method but has limited sensitivity.
- WHO recommends typhoid conjugate vaccine (TCV) particularly in high-burden or high-AMR settings.

Prelims + Mains Perspective

- **Prelims:** Typhoid is bacterial, not viral. Prevention combines safe water, sanitation, food hygiene and vaccination.
- **India angle:** India produced the first WHO-prequalified TCV, Typbar-TCV, in 2017.
- **Challenge:** empirical antibiotic treatment fuels antimicrobial resistance and weak surveillance hides resistance patterns.
- **Way forward:** integrate TCV with WASH, diagnostic stewardship, culture-based surveillance and AMR monitoring.

3. Mission Rangeen Machhli 2031 & Ornamental Fisheries

GS-III Fisheries, Blue Economy, Agriculture | PIB/Department of Fisheries, 31 Aug 2026

Why in News

The Vice President is scheduled to release 'Mission Rangeen Machhli 2031' at Agatti, Lakshadweep, creating a strategic action framework for ornamental fisheries development.

Background / Context

- The mission focuses on scientific management, biosecurity, quality assurance, traceability, quarantine, hatchery standards, transport and trade.
- PIB notes India's coastline at about 11,099 km and EEZ at roughly 2.2-2.4 million sq km; Lakshadweep has a very large EEZ relative to its land area.
- Lakshadweep has also been notified as a dedicated Seaweed Cluster.

Prelims + Mains Perspective

- **Prelims:** Agatti is in Lakshadweep in the Arabian Sea; ornamental fisheries are distinct from capture fisheries for food.
- **Significance:** high-value niche exports, women's livelihoods, hatchery entrepreneurship and island blue-economy diversification.
- **Risks:** invasive species, disease transmission, over-collection from reefs and poor animal-welfare standards.
- **Way forward:** captive breeding, quarantine, traceability, reef-safe collection standards, certification and local value addition.

4. INS Nipun: Indigenous Diving Support Vessel

Why in News

The Indian Navy is commissioning Nipun, the second indigenous Diving Support Vessel of the Nistar class, at Naval Dockyard, Mumbai.

Background / Context

- Nipun was designed and built by Hindustan Shipyard Limited, Visakhapatnam.
- A DSV supports deep-sea diving, underwater intervention, precise station keeping, medical support and submarine-rescue operations.
- Specialised vessels expand naval capability beyond combat by enabling salvage, inspection, recovery and underwater maintenance.

Prelims + Mains Perspective

- **Prelims:** Hindustan Shipyard Limited is located at Visakhapatnam on India's east coast; Mumbai Naval Dockyard is on the west coast.
- **Significance:** strengthens submarine-rescue readiness and indigenous specialised shipbuilding.
- **Strategic angle:** underwater domain awareness and rescue capacity become more important as submarine fleets expand.
- **Way forward:** indigenous diving systems, remotely operated vehicles, deep-submergence training and interoperable regional rescue exercises.

5. Electronics Component Manufacturing: Moving Beyond Assembly

GS-III Economy, Manufacturing, Technology | PIB/MeitY current background

Why in News

India's Electronics Components Manufacturing Scheme (ECMS) has become a major value-addition policy tool: 106 projects have been approved, 38 plants are operational and 16 are in advanced construction or machinery-installation stages.

Background / Context

- Approved investment is about Rs 69,548 crore across 15 states, with expected direct employment of about 74,628.
- The scheme targets components and materials such as camera/display modules, optical transceivers, connectors, relays, capacitors, rare-earth permanent magnets, anode material and electrolyte additives.
- The policy objective is to deepen domestic value addition rather than remain primarily an assembly base.

Prelims + Mains Perspective

- **Prelims:** MeitY administers major electronics-manufacturing initiatives; ECMS is distinct from semiconductor fabrication incentives.
- **Significance:** import substitution, supply-chain resilience, higher domestic value addition and export competitiveness.
- **Challenges:** component ecosystems require scale, materials, testing, design capability, skilled labour and stable trade policy.
- **Way forward:** cluster infrastructure, R&D, standards labs, supply-chain finance, design-linked incentives and integration with semiconductor missions.

6. Ethanol, Fuel Self-Reliance and Food Security

Why in News

A fresh editorial debate asks whether fuel self-reliance policies can unintentionally stress food markets if feedstock choices and price signals are poorly designed.

Background / Context

- Biofuel policy sits at the intersection of energy security, farm incomes, water use, sugar/cereal markets and climate policy.
- Ethanol can reduce petroleum import dependence, but feedstock diversion may affect food/fodder availability and prices.
- The correct policy question is not 'ethanol versus food' in absolute terms, but which feedstocks, incentives and safeguards minimise trade-offs.

A current opinion piece links the idea of 'Saptadhara' to India's soft power and argues that cultural assets should also create dignified livelihoods and exportable creative value.

Background / Context

- Soft power, associated with Joseph Nye, is the ability to shape preferences through attraction rather than coercion or payment.
- India's assets include yoga, Ayurveda, literature, cinema, cuisine, crafts, handlooms, democracy, digital public infrastructure, science, space achievements and diaspora networks.
- Cultural visibility does not automatically translate into sustainable income for artists or global market access.

Background / Context

- Cyber attribution is difficult because attackers can route operations through third-party infrastructure and reuse tools.
- Critical systems need layered security even when an intrusion attempt does not result in confirmed data loss.
- State-linked cyber operations blur espionage, strategic signalling and preparation of access for future crises.

- Memory chips are essential for computers, phones, data centres and AI systems; market concentration creates strategic vulnerability.

A fresh report on Sri Lankan refugees in Tamil Nadu has reopened questions of voluntary repatriation, documentation, livelihoods and the meaning of safe, dignified return.

Background / Context

- India is not a party to the 1951 Refugee Convention, but refugee protection is shaped by constitutional rights, executive policy and international humanitarian principles.
- Voluntary repatriation must be informed, safe and dignified; return decisions depend on housing, livelihoods, documentation and security in the country of origin.
- The issue intersects with Tamil Nadu politics, India-Sri Lanka relations and post-conflict reconciliation.

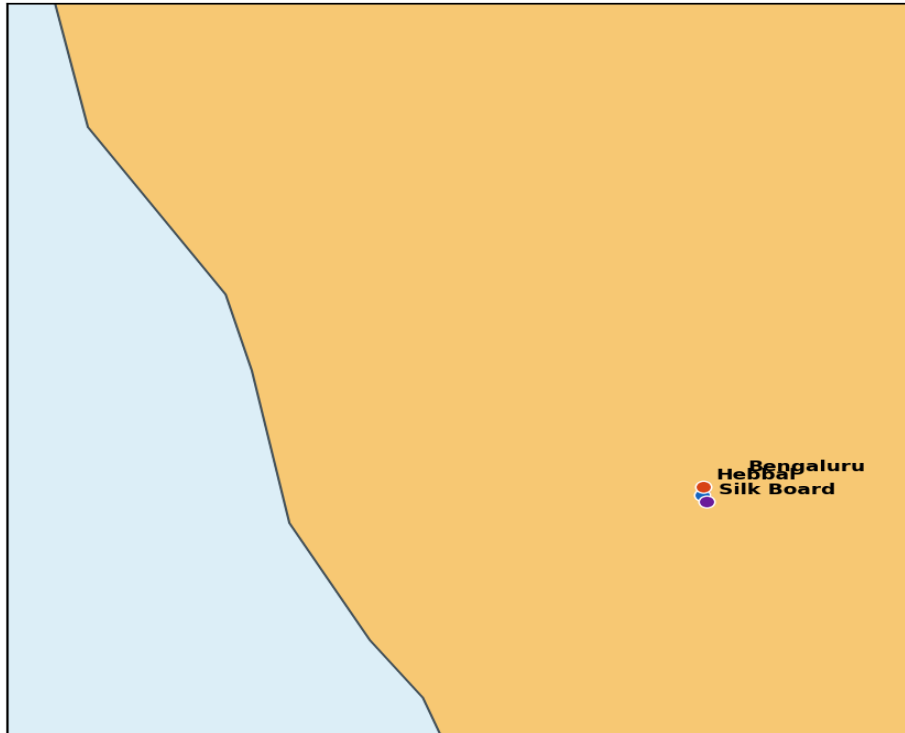

BENGALURU: PROPOSED NORTH-SOUTH TUNNEL ROAD CORRIDOR

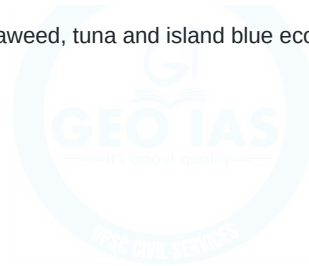


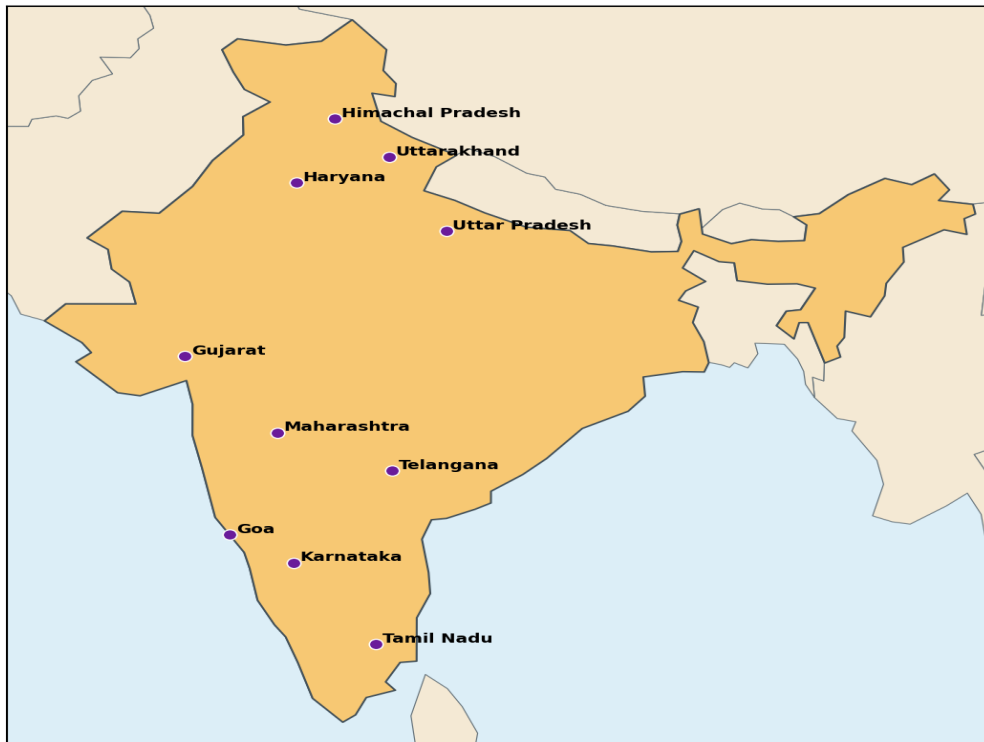

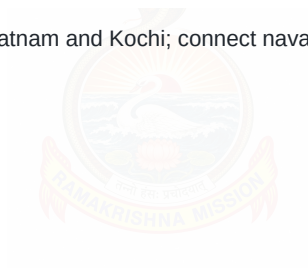

3 MAINS QUESTIONS WITH EXAM-READY MODEL ANSWERS

Q1. 'Urban transport infrastructure must be evaluated as a governance and land-use issue, not merely an engineering project.' Discuss in the context of large urban road and tunnel projects. (250 words)

Mobility dimension: Additional road capacity may produce induced demand, drawing more private vehicles and eventually recreating congestion. Cities need integrated metro, bus, walking and cycling networks, parking policy and transit-oriented development.

Ecological dimension: Parks, trees, lakes and drainage are urban infrastructure too. Their loss can intensify heat and flooding while lowering liveability.

Way forward: Adopt multimodal cost-benefit assessment, independent project review, public disclosure of traffic assumptions, life-cycle fiscal analysis and ecological accounting.

Conclusion: The objective should be accessibility and liveability, not simply faster car movement.

Q2. How can vaccination policy become an important instrument in India's fight against antimicrobial resistance? Explain with the example of typhoid. (250 words)

STRUCTURED MODEL ANSWER

Introduction: Antimicrobial resistance rises when microbes are repeatedly exposed to antibiotics. Vaccines reduce the number of infections and therefore the number of antibiotic prescriptions required.

Limits: Vaccination alone cannot replace safe water, sanitation, food hygiene or laboratory capacity. Surveillance is needed to track resistance and vaccine effectiveness.

Way forward: Integrate TCV introduction with WASH, blood-culture networks, antibiotic stewardship, point-of-care diagnostic research and AMR surveillance.

Conclusion: Vaccination should be seen not only as infectious-disease prevention but also as upstream AMR policy.

Q3. 'India's next phase of manufacturing policy must move from assembly scale to component and materials depth.' Examine with reference to electronics. (250 words)

- Humans are the reservoir for *S. Typhi*. Chronic carriers can sustain transmission.
- Blood culture is a conventional reference diagnostic; prior antibiotics can reduce sensitivity. A single Widal test is not sufficiently specific in endemic settings.
- Typhoid conjugate vaccines link Vi polysaccharide antigen to a carrier protein, improving immune response in young children.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE

- Frame typhoid as a WASH + vaccination + diagnostics + AMR issue, not merely an infectious-disease issue.
- Vaccination reduces infections and therefore antibiotic consumption and selection pressure for resistant strains.
- Way forward: TCV in high-burden settings, safe water/sanitation, culture networks, antimicrobial stewardship and resistance surveillance.

Mission Rangan Machhli 2031 — PRELIMS FACTUAL

PRELIMS FACTUAL

- Released for ornamental fisheries development; official framework covers broodstock, breeding, hatcheries, quarantine, health, traceability, handling, transport and trade.
- Lakshadweep is a Union Territory in the Arabian Sea; Agatti has an airport and is part of the coral-island archipelago.
- Lakshadweep has also been notified as a Seaweed Cluster under the fisheries cluster approach.
- Biosecurity and quarantine are crucial because ornamental-fish trade can transmit pathogens and invasive alien species.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE

- Blue economy must combine livelihoods with ecological carrying capacity.
- Potential: hatchery entrepreneurship, women-led enterprises, export diversification and island value addition.

- DSVs support deep-sea diving, underwater intervention, precise station keeping, medical support and submarine-rescue operations.
- Visakhapatnam is on the Bay of Bengal; Mumbai is on the Arabian Sea.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE

- Connect indigenous shipbuilding with underwater-domain capability, submarine safety and maritime resilience.
- Specialised support platforms are force multipliers even when they are not front-line combatants.
- Way forward: indigenous ROVs, diving systems, rescue interoperability, deep-submergence training and stronger shipbuilding supply chains.

Electronics Component Manufacturing — PRELIMS FACTUAL

PRELIMS FACTUAL

- ECMS is administered by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology.
- Official August data: 106 approved projects; approved investment about Rs 69,548 crore; about 74,628 expected direct jobs; 38 plants operational and 16 in advanced construction/machinery stages.
- Approved products include camera/display modules, optical transceivers, connectors, relays, coils, filters, capacitors, rare-earth permanent magnets, anode material and electrolyte additives.
- Component manufacturing is distinct from semiconductor wafer fabrication, though the ecosystems overlap.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE

- India must move from assembly scale to value-chain depth: components → materials → tooling/testing → design → final products.
- Benefits: import-risk reduction, domestic value addition, skilled jobs and export competitiveness.
- Challenges: scale, quality standards, critical minerals, capital equipment and technology. Way forward: clusters, R&D, testing labs, design incentives and trusted supply chains.

- Geographical Indications protect goods whose qualities/reputation are linked to geographic origin; they can support cultural-economic value chains.

- Convert cultural capital into creative-economy outcomes: skills, IP, finance, translation, digital distribution, tourism and exports.
- Soft power is credible when domestic institutions and values reinforce external messaging.
- Way forward: creator livelihoods, GI/IP support, cultural missions, global-language translation and market-oriented apprenticeships.

Cyber Intrusions — PRELIMS FACTUAL

- CERT-In is the national agency for cyber-incident response under MeitY.
- Targeting, attempted intrusion and confirmed compromise are not synonymous.

- Zero-trust architecture assumes no user/device is automatically trusted merely because it is inside a network perimeter.

QUESTION

Question: Urban transport infrastructure must be evaluated as a governance and land-use issue, not merely an engineering project. Discuss. (250 words)

QUESTION-DEMAND DECODE

Demand: Explain why mega transport projects require institutional, mobility, ecological and fiscal assessment in addition to engineering feasibility.

Introduction: Congestion is produced by the interaction of urban form, commuting patterns, public transport, parking, road supply and governance. Hence a tunnel or expressway is a city-planning choice, not simply a civil-engineering structure.

1. Governance and rule of law

Large projects require lawful land-use decisions, transparent DPRs, public consultation and clear accountability. Retrospective regularisation can weaken institutional trust if it bypasses normal scrutiny.

2. Mobility effectiveness

Extra road capacity can generate induced demand. The relevant metric is people moved per unit of scarce urban space; high-capacity public transport often performs better than car-oriented expansion.

3. Ecological dimension

Parks, urban trees, lakes and drainage moderate heat, flooding and pollution. Their opportunity cost must enter project appraisal.

4. Fiscal dimension

Capital cost, maintenance, ventilation, safety and debt obligations should be compared with alternative investments in metro, buses and non-motorised transport.

WAY FORWARD

Way Forward: Independent DPR and lifecycle-cost review; multimodal transport modelling; transit-oriented development; parking/congestion pricing; complete-street networks; ecological accounting and public disclosure.

MODEL ANSWER 2 — Typhoid Vaccination & AMR

QUESTION

Question: How can vaccination policy become an important instrument in India's fight against antimicrobial resistance? Explain with the example of typhoid. (250 words)

QUESTION-DEMAND DECODE

Demand: Establish the causal link between disease prevention, reduced antibiotic use and slower emergence of resistance; then apply it to typhoid.

Introduction: AMR is driven partly by unnecessary and repeated antimicrobial exposure. Vaccination acts upstream by preventing infections and thereby reducing both antibiotic demand and opportunities for resistant strains to be selected.

1. Typhoid burden and diagnostic uncertainty

Typhoid is a bacterial, faeco-oral disease. In endemic settings, non-specific fever and weak diagnostic practices can encourage empirical antibiotic treatment.

2. Vaccination-AMR pathway

Typhoid conjugate vaccines prevent cases, reduce transmission and lower the number of antibiotic courses. This reduces selection pressure on *Salmonella* Typhi.

3. Why vaccines are not sufficient alone

Unsafe water, sanitation deficits and food contamination sustain transmission. Blood-culture capacity and resistance surveillance remain essential.

4. Wider policy relevance

Vaccines against bacterial and secondary bacterial infections can reduce antimicrobial consumption across the health system.

WAY FORWARD

Way Forward: Target TCV to high-burden settings; integrate it with WASH; strengthen blood-culture laboratories; discourage single-test Widal diagnosis; enforce antimicrobial stewardship and genomic/resistance surveillance.

CONCLUSION

Conclusion: Vaccination should be treated as both preventive health policy and antimicrobial-conservation policy.

Scale economics, critical minerals, testing standards, specialised skills, technology access and reliable logistics remain bottlenecks.

WAY FORWARD
