1. Q1 FY 2026-27 GDP: 7.8% Growth - Reading Beyond the Headline

GS-III: Indian Economy - growth, national income, investment, employment; Prelims: GDP/GVA, constant vs current prices

WHY IN NEWS

MoSPI released the first-quarter national accounts on 31 August. Real GDP grew 7.8% year-on-year in April-June 2026-27, while nominal GDP grew 10.3%. The release uses the new national-accounts series with base year 2022-23. The news matters because the number beat the RBI's earlier 7% estimate, but the policy debate is about composition, jobs, investment and resilience.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

What GDP measures: GDP is the monetary value of final goods and services produced within the domestic territory during a period. Real GDP removes the effect of price changes by using constant prices; nominal GDP is measured at current prices.

GDP vs GVA: Gross Value Added measures value created by producers. GDP at market prices is obtained after adding product taxes and subtracting product subsidies from aggregate GVA.

Why the base year changed: In February 2026, MoSPI shifted the GDP base from 2011-12 to 2022-23. Base-year revision updates the economic structure, classifications, data sources and deflators. The new series incorporates new high-frequency indicators and updated price/industrial series.

Why revisions happen: Quarterly GDP initially uses incomplete/high-frequency data. As annual surveys, company accounts and administrative data become available, estimates can be revised. A preliminary quarterly number should therefore be read as an informed estimate, not an immutable count.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- New GDP series base year: **2022-23**, replacing 2011-12.
- Q1 FY 2026-27 real GDP growth: **7.8%**; nominal GDP growth: **10.3%**.
- Constant-price growth approximates volume/output growth; current-price growth includes price effects.
- GDP = GVA + product taxes - product subsidies.
- A base-year revision is different from a routine annual revision because it can change methodology, sources, classifications and deflation strategy.
- UPSC trap: a high real-GDP growth rate does not automatically imply equal growth in employment, per-capita income or household welfare.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Positive signals:** Stronger manufacturing/services and construction can indicate broad supply-side momentum. Healthy private consumption supports demand, while capital formation/public capex can crowd in private investment.
- **Quality-of-growth test:** UPSC answers should ask whether growth is employment-intensive, productivity-enhancing, geographically broad and accompanied by rising real wages. Headline GDP can rise even when particular groups or sectors remain stressed.
- **External vulnerability:** India remains a major crude importer. High oil prices can widen the current account, raise input costs and transmit into inflation. Trade fragmentation can affect exports and investment.
- **Climate channel:** A weak monsoon or strong El Nino can affect agriculture, food prices, rural demand and monetary policy. Thus macroeconomic resilience is linked to climate resilience.
- **Policy direction:** Improve logistics, skills and ease of doing business; deepen MSME credit; strengthen manufacturing value chains; maintain fiscal-monetary stability; and track jobs, productivity, real wages and per-capita income alongside GDP.

2. SIR Draft Electoral Rolls - Integrity, Inclusion and Due Process

GS-II: Constitution, Election Commission, Representation of the People; Governance; Prelims: Article 324, RPA 1950, voter registration

WHY IN NEWS

Draft rolls produced under the Special Intensive Revision have led to very large deletions across phases, making the quality of electoral rolls a major governance issue. The current debate is not whether rolls should be revised - they must be - but how the process can remove ineligible entries without excluding eligible citizens.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Constitutional position: Article 324 vests the superintendence, direction and control of elections in the Election Commission of India. Electoral rolls are governed principally by the Representation of the People Act, 1950 and the Registration of Electors Rules, 1960.

Eligibility: An elector must be an Indian citizen, at least 18 years old with reference to the qualifying date, and ordinarily resident in the constituency. Four qualifying dates - 1 January, 1 April, 1 July and 1 October - facilitate registration during the year.

Why revision is needed: Rolls accumulate entries of deceased persons, duplicates, shifted residents and data errors. Revision is essential for 'one eligible citizen, one valid entry'.

Why intensive revision is sensitive: Documentation burdens and notice failures can disproportionately affect migrants, elderly persons, women whose residence/name changes after marriage, homeless citizens and marginalised groups.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Article **324** - Election Commission's constitutional authority over elections.
- RPA **1950** primarily concerns electoral rolls/seat allocation; RPA **1951** primarily concerns conduct of elections, qualifications/disqualifications and election disputes.
- Form 6 is used for new voter registration.
- ECI Phase III SIR covers 16 States and 3 UTs; official voter services provide enumeration/document submission routes.
- A draft roll is not the final roll: claims, objections, hearings and correction mechanisms are part of due process.
- UPSC trap: possession of a voter ID card by itself does not override the legal requirement that the person's name be on the electoral roll.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Roll purity:** Duplicate, deceased or non-resident entries can distort administration and weaken confidence in elections.
- **Inclusion:** Wrongful exclusion is more serious than a routine database error because it directly affects political participation. Administrative efficiency must therefore be balanced with procedural fairness.
- **Due process:** Deletion should be based on traceable reasons, notice, opportunity to respond and an accessible appeal/correction route. Digital systems should supplement, not replace, physical assistance.
- **Institutional trust:** Publishing deletion categories, error rates, claims accepted/rejected and reasons can reduce political suspicion.
- **Way forward:** Multilingual help desks, door-step assistance for vulnerable electors, interoperable but privacy-protecting databases, independent process audits, transparent dashboards and time-bound disposal of claims/objections.

3. Bihar-Jharkhand Sone River Water Agreement - Cooperative Federalism in Practice

GS-II: Federalism, Inter-State relations; GS-III: Water resources; GS-I: Indian river systems

WHY IN NEWS

Bihar and Jharkhand signed an MoU on Sone River water sharing on 31 August in the presence of the Union Home Minister. The Union described it as resolution of a long-standing dispute, with expected benefits for irrigation and drinking water.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

River geography: The Sone (Son) rises near the Amarkantak highlands and flows north-eastwards to join the Ganga. Its basin connects parts of Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand and Bihar and has long supported irrigation systems.

Why inter-State water is difficult: Political boundaries divide a hydrological system. Upstream storage, seasonal releases, irrigation demand, drought and floods can create asymmetric interests.

Constitutional framework: Entry 17 of the State List covers water subject to Entry 56 of the Union List, which permits Union regulation/development of inter-State rivers in the public interest. Article 262 enables Parliament to provide for adjudication of inter-State river disputes.

Statutory route: The Inter-State River Water Disputes Act, 1956 provides for tribunals. Negotiated agreements can avoid long adjudication where states can agree on allocation and operating rules.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Sone is a **right-bank/southern tributary of the Ganga system**.
- Amarkantak is an important watershed region associated with the Narmada and Sone systems.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Federal significance:** Negotiation converts federalism from a constitutional principle into an operating arrangement. It can reduce litigation and create predictable seasonal releases.
- **Development impact:** Reliable water can improve crop planning, drinking-water security and drought management in water-stressed districts.
- **Data problem:** Agreements fail when states do not trust discharge, storage or rainfall data. Joint telemetry and public hydrological datasets are therefore institutional infrastructure.
- **Climate challenge:** Historical allocations may become unrealistic as rainfall variability and extreme events alter dependable flows.
- **Ecological dimension:** A river is not only a divisible quantity of water. Sediment, aquatic ecology, groundwater recharge and environmental flows must be incorporated.
- **Way forward:** Joint basin board, real-time data, seasonal/drought allocation formula, flood coordination, groundwater-surface-water integration, environmental-flow norms and periodic review.

4. September Monsoon Outlook - Below Normal National Rainfall, Local Extremes Still Possible

GS-I: Indian climatology; GS-III: Agriculture, water resources, disaster management; Prelims: LPA, El Nino, monsoon systems

WHY IN NEWS

IMD's 31 August monthly outlook says all-India September rainfall is most likely below normal, below 91% of the Long Period Average. It also notes strong El Nino conditions and above-normal maximum temperatures over most of India. This comes after a deficient August.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

What LPA means: Long Period Average is a climatological benchmark. IMD states September's all-India LPA, based on 1971-2020 data, is about 167.9 mm.

Spatial distribution matters: A national deficit does not mean every district is dry. IMD expects some areas of northwest, northeast, east, east-central and southeast peninsular India to receive normal to above-normal rainfall.

Why extremes coexist with deficit: Seasonal totals average rainfall across time and space. A few intense low-pressure-system events can cause floods even while long dry spells leave the monthly total deficient.

El Nino link: El Nino is anomalous warming of the central/eastern equatorial Pacific. It often weakens the Indian summer monsoon statistically, but the relationship is not deterministic because the Indian Ocean, intraseasonal oscillations and synoptic systems also matter.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- September 2026 all-India rainfall forecast: **below normal, <91% of LPA.**
- September LPA (1971-2020): about **167.9 mm.**
- IMD uses a **Multi-Model Ensemble** for monthly/seasonal forecasts.
- Strong El Nino conditions prevail over the equatorial Pacific according to the current IMD outlook.
- A low-pressure area/depression over the Bay of Bengal can generate heavy rainfall over east-central India even in an overall deficient month.
- UPSC trap: 'below-normal monsoon' and 'floods' are not contradictory statements.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Agriculture:** Late kharif crops depend on soil moisture during grain filling. Deficit rainfall can increase irrigation demand and affect yields.
- **Water-energy nexus:** Reservoir storage influences irrigation, drinking water and hydropower. A weak September can reduce carry-over storage for the rabi season.
- **Inflation:** Crop stress can transmit to food prices, rural incomes and monetary-policy decisions.
- **Heat risk:** IMD expects above-normal maximum temperatures over most regions, increasing evapotranspiration and heat stress where rainfall is weak.
- **Disaster-management lesson:** Drought and flood preparedness must coexist. District-level rainfall, soil moisture and reservoir status are more useful than national averages for operational decisions.
- **Way forward:** Agromet advisories, irrigation scheduling, short-duration/drought-tolerant crops, reservoir rule curves, crop insurance, groundwater budgeting and better sub-seasonal forecasts.

5. GSLV-F17 / EOS-05 - ISRO's Return to Flight

GS-III: Space technology, indigenisation; Prelims: launch vehicles, Earth observation, Sriharikota

WHY IN NEWS

ISRO announced that EOS-05 will be launched by GSLV-F17 from Sriharikota on 4 September at 02:55 am. It would end a roughly seven-month launch hiatus after the PSLV-C62/EOS-N1 failure in January.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Launch-vehicle logic: A launch vehicle provides the velocity and trajectory needed to inject a satellite into orbit. Different launchers are optimised for different payload masses and orbital regimes.

GSLV: India's Geosynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle family uses a cryogenic upper stage in relevant variants and is intended for heavier missions than the classic PSLV class.

Earth observation: EO satellites use remote-sensing payloads to observe land, ocean, atmosphere and human activity. Applications include agriculture, disaster management, forestry, water resources, cartography and security.

Return-to-flight: After a failure, space agencies reconstruct the flight sequence, identify root causes, implement corrective actions and validate hardware/software before the next mission. Reliability is therefore an institutional process, not only a technical property.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Satish Dhawan Space Centre is at **Sriharikota, Andhra Pradesh**.
- EOS = Earth Observation Satellite.
- PSLV and GSLV are different launch-vehicle families; GSLV is associated with heavier/geosynchronous-class missions.
- Cryogenic propulsion uses propellants stored at very low temperatures; it offers high efficiency but greater engineering complexity.
- Remote sensing may use optical, microwave/radar, thermal or other sensors depending on mission objectives.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Strategic significance:** Reliable access to space supports communications, navigation, weather, disaster response, resource management and strategic autonomy.
- **Mission assurance:** A high launch cadence is valuable only if reliability remains high. Failure investigation should be rigorous and institutional learning should be preserved.
- **Economic dimension:** India's commercial-space ambitions require predictable launch schedules and confidence among domestic/private customers.
- **Downstream value:** The largest public value often comes not from the launch itself but from usable data products integrated into agriculture, urban planning and disaster systems.
- **Way forward:** Redundancy in critical components, stronger quality assurance, domestic electronics/propulsion supply chains, private-sector integration and open/interoperable EO data products where security permits.

6. Modi-Putin Meeting at Bishkek - Strategic Autonomy amid the Russia-Ukraine War

GS-II: India and major powers, regional groupings, effects of global politics; Prelims: SCO/Central Asia

WHY IN NEWS

PM Narendra Modi met Russian President Vladimir Putin in Bishkek on the sidelines of the SCO Summit and urged movement from an 'endless war' toward an end to the war. Both sides reaffirmed the Special and Privileged Strategic Partnership.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Long-term relationship: India-Russia cooperation spans defence platforms, nuclear energy, hydrocarbons, fertilizers, space and multilateral diplomacy.

Strategic partnership: The bilateral Strategic Partnership was elevated to a Special and Privileged Strategic Partnership in 2010.

Why Russia matters: Russia remains important to India's defence inventory, energy diversification and Eurasian diplomacy. It is also a permanent member of the UN Security Council.

Why the war complicates ties: Western sanctions, payment systems, shipping/insurance and Russia's closer relationship with China create strategic and commercial constraints for India.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Bishkek is the capital of **Kyrgyzstan**.
- SCO is a Eurasian organisation; India is a full member.
- India and Russia use the Annual Summit as the highest institutionalised bilateral political mechanism.
- Strategic autonomy means independent decision-making and diversified partnerships; it is not equivalent to neutrality on every issue.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Energy security:** Russian energy can diversify supply and moderate import costs, but sanctions/payment risks must be managed.
- **Defence:** Legacy dependence creates maintenance/spares requirements even as India diversifies suppliers and indigenises production.
- **Diplomacy:** India seeks dialogue and negotiated settlement while maintaining ties with Russia, Europe, the US and Ukraine.
- **China factor:** A Russia increasingly dependent on China can alter Eurasian power balances, giving India an interest in retaining independent Russia ties.
- **Trade imbalance:** Large commodity imports require greater Indian exports and investment to make the relationship economically balanced.
- **Way forward:** Expand pharmaceuticals, engineering and services exports; strengthen connectivity/payment resilience; co-produce defence technology; maintain principled support for diplomacy and international law.

7. 4th Indo-German Environment Forum - 'Together For More Resilience'

GS-II: Bilateral relations; GS-III: Environment, climate finance, green technology

WHY IN NEWS

India and Germany are holding the 4th Indo-German Environment Forum in New Delhi on 1 September under the theme 'Together For More Resilience'. The forum is designed as a high-level platform connecting government, business, research and civil society.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Why Germany is important: Germany is a major technology, manufacturing, climate-finance and development partner. India-Germany cooperation increasingly links decarbonisation with industrial competitiveness.

Resilience: Climate resilience is the ability of systems to anticipate, absorb, adapt to and recover from climate shocks while maintaining essential functions.

Circular economy: It seeks to reduce virgin-resource use and waste through durable design, reuse, repair, remanufacturing and recycling.

Just transition: Climate policy must account for workers, regions and firms that bear transition costs, especially MSMEs and fossil-fuel-dependent communities.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- The forum's theme is **Together For More Resilience**.
- Key themes include low-carbon industry, biodiversity, circular economy, sustainable finance, green skills and investment.
- Mitigation reduces causes of climate change; adaptation reduces vulnerability to impacts; resilience is the system-level capacity to cope and recover.
- Climate finance can include grants, concessional loans, guarantees, equity and blended-finance structures.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Technology opportunity:** Green hydrogen, energy efficiency, waste management, industrial decarbonisation and circular manufacturing can benefit from joint R&D; and deployment.
- **Finance challenge:** Many adaptation projects generate public benefits but weak direct cash flows. Blended finance and guarantees can make them bankable.
- **MSME challenge:** Carbon standards and green supply-chain requirements can exclude smaller firms unless technology and finance are accessible.
- **Urban relevance:** Heat, flooding, waste and air pollution make city-level resilience a natural area for bilateral cooperation.
- **Way forward:** Joint demonstration projects, green-skills programmes, MSME technology windows, interoperable standards, adaptation finance and measurable local resilience indicators.

8. Machinery & Electrical Equipment Safety Regulation - Standards as Industrial Policy

GS-II: Regulatory governance; GS-III: Industry, MSMEs, quality infrastructure; Prelims: BIS Act

WHY IN NEWS

A machinery and electrical-equipment safety technical-regulation framework becomes applicable from 1 September 2026. It links covered machinery/equipment to Indian Standards and conformity-assessment requirements.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Why technical regulation exists: Machinery can create mechanical, electrical, thermal, fire and ergonomic hazards. Minimum standards reduce information asymmetry and prevent unsafe products from competing only on price.

BIS framework: The Bureau of Indian Standards Act, 2016 is the principal statutory framework for national standards and notified conformity requirements.

Standard vs technical regulation: A standard is generally voluntary unless incorporated into a mandatory regulation/order. Once legally mandated, conformity becomes a market-access requirement.

Quality infrastructure: Standards need testing laboratories, calibration, certification, accreditation and competent inspectors. Regulation without this ecosystem can create bottlenecks.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- BIS Act: **2016**.
- Conformity assessment may involve testing, certification, inspection and quality-system requirements.
- Type-A machinery standards generally address basic concepts/design principles; Type-B standards address generic safety aspects; Type-C standards address particular machines.
- UPSC trap: BIS standards are not automatically mandatory merely because a standard exists; compulsory compliance requires legal notification/regulation.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Safety gain:** Better machine guarding, electrical protection and design standards can reduce occupational accidents and consumer risk.
- **Competitiveness:** Quality compliance can improve export readiness and integration into global value chains.
- **MSME cost:** Testing, redesign and certification can be proportionately expensive for small firms, especially when laboratory capacity is limited.
- **Trade dimension:** Legitimate safety rules should be transparent, non-discriminatory and evidence-based so that they do not become disguised protectionism.
- **Way forward:** Phased compliance, common testing facilities, subsidised MSME testing, digital documentation, accredited-lab expansion and periodic harmonisation with international standards where appropriate.

9. Bank Credit Surge - What Rapid Credit Growth Tells Us

GS-III: Banking, monetary transmission, investment, MSMEs; Prelims: non-food credit, NPA, monetary transmission

WHY IN NEWS

RBI data reported on 1 September show strong year-on-year non-food bank-credit growth, with industry and services credit expanding above 20%. The important question is whether this represents healthy investment/working-capital demand or creates future asset-quality risks.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

What non-food credit means: Food credit is largely associated with financing food procurement. Non-food credit therefore gives a clearer picture of bank lending to industry, services, agriculture, personal loans and other sectors.

Transmission: When policy rates, liquidity and bank balance sheets permit, lower/easier financing conditions can increase credit demand and investment. But demand also depends on business confidence and expected returns.

Credit cycle: Strong credit can support growth; excessively rapid or poorly underwritten credit can later generate non-performing assets.

MSME importance: Smaller firms often lack collateral or long credit histories, making cash-flow-based underwriting, guarantees and digital data important for access.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Non-food credit excludes the banking system's **food-procurement credit**.
- NPA = a loan where scheduled repayment has remained overdue beyond the regulatory threshold; asset-quality definitions are set by RBI norms.
- Credit growth should be compared with deposit growth, liquidity, capital adequacy and sector concentration.
- UPSC trap: rapid credit growth is neither automatically inflationary nor automatically healthy - the effect depends on use, supply capacity and underwriting quality.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Positive interpretation:** Industry/services borrowing can signal stronger working-capital demand, capex and business confidence.
- **Monetary-policy link:** Credit expansion shows how financial conditions transmit to the real economy, but too much leverage can amplify later downturns.
- **Financial-stability risk:** Sectoral concentration, unsecured lending or weak project appraisal can create future NPAs.
- **Inclusion:** The policy goal is not merely more credit but productive credit reaching viable MSMEs, new firms and underserved regions.

10. Manipur - Renewed Violence, Census Deferral and the Requirements of Durable Peace

GS-II: Federalism, governance, vulnerable sections; GS-III: Internal security; GS-IV: state legitimacy and impartiality

WHY IN NEWS

Fresh killings in Kangpokpi district have underlined the fragility of peace. Separately, current reporting says the Centre deferred Census operations in Manipur following demands from civil-society groups. Together, these developments show how security, identity, population data, displacement and political trust are intertwined.

BACKGROUND / CONCEPTUAL EXPLANATION

Geography matters: Manipur's valley-hill structure overlaps with patterns of settlement, land rights, administration and political representation. Geography therefore shapes both security logistics and political claims.

Conflict dynamics: Communal/ethnic violence can produce displacement, segregated settlement, arms proliferation, misinformation and parallel social institutions. These effects persist even after large-scale violence falls.

Why Census becomes sensitive: Population data influence planning, representation debates and perceptions of demographic change. In a conflict setting, displacement can complicate enumeration and intensify fears about citizenship or identity.

Constitutional-administrative setting: Police and public order are State List subjects, but the Union has major responsibilities and powers relating to internal security, armed forces, constitutional machinery and inter-state/strategic coordination.

PRELIMS FACTUAL - MUST REVISE

- Manipur is a northeastern state bordering **Myanmar**.
- Police and public order are in the **State List**.
- Census is a Union subject and is conducted under the Census Act, 1948 framework.
- Kangpokpi is in the hill region north of the Imphal valley.

MAINS PERSPECTIVE - ANALYSIS

- **Security:** Civilian protection, arms recovery, intelligence coordination and prevention of retaliatory violence are immediate priorities.
- **Justice:** Impartial investigation and prosecution are essential. Perceived selective enforcement destroys confidence in the state.
- **Humanitarian:** Displaced persons require housing, education, health, documents, livelihoods and safe-return options.
- **Political dialogue:** Durable settlement requires structured engagement across affected communities, including women, youth and local institutions.
- **Information governance:** Rumours and manipulated media can trigger violence. Credible official communication and community verification networks matter.
- **Way forward:** Security stabilisation -> impartial accountability -> rehabilitation -> dialogue on political/administrative grievances -> livelihood restoration -> monitored peace commitments.

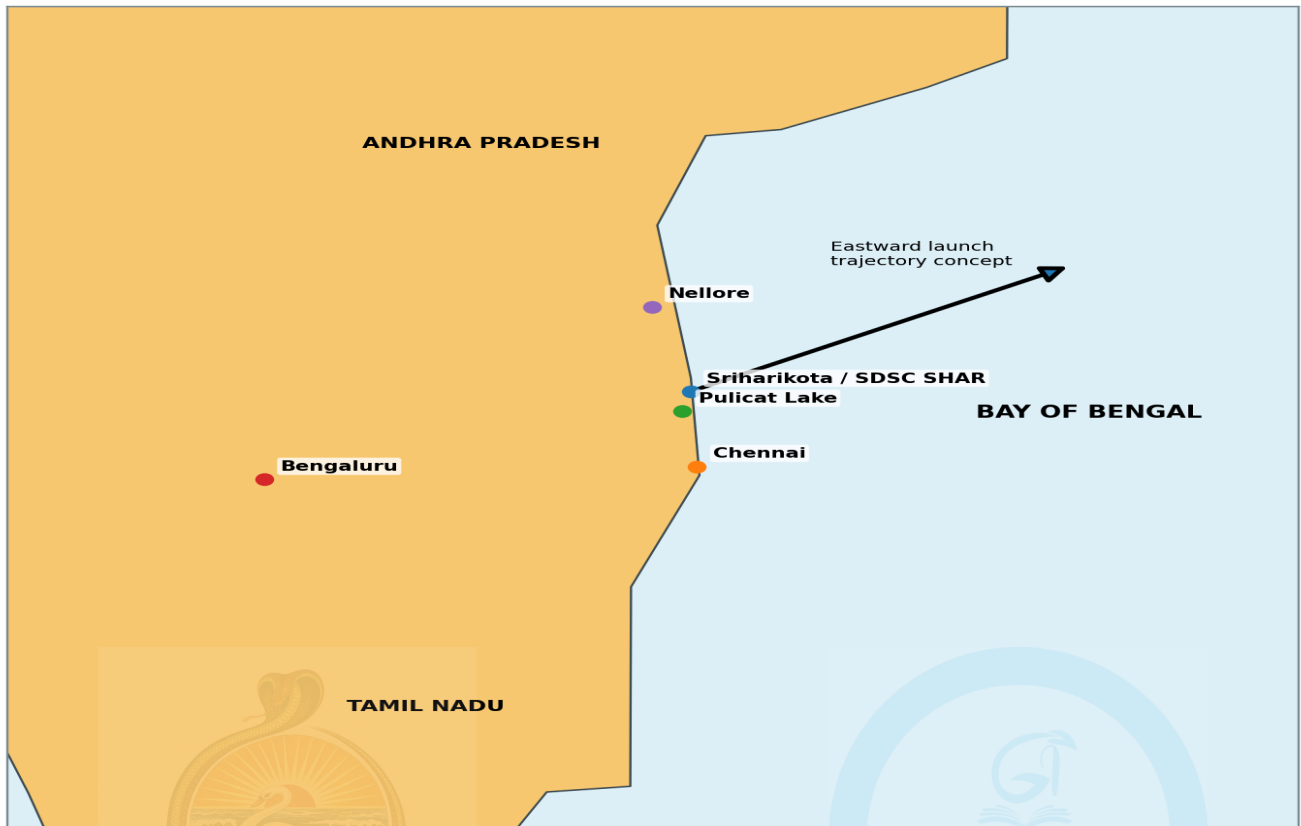

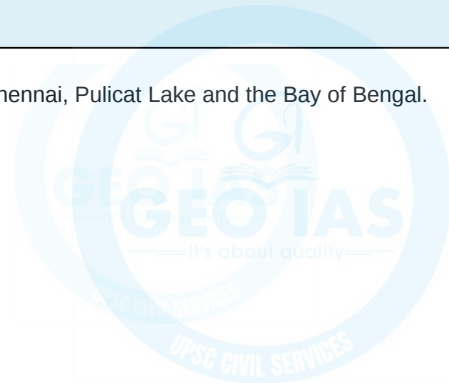
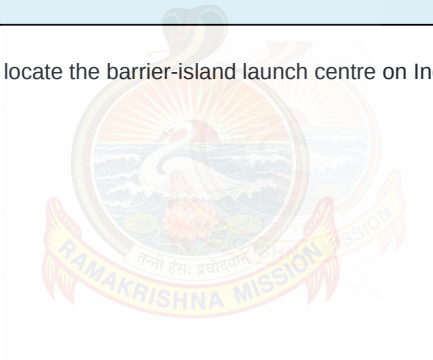

3 EXAM-READY MAINS MODEL ANSWERS

Q1. 'A high GDP growth rate is necessary but not sufficient for high-quality development.' Discuss in the context of India's Q1 FY 2026-27 growth. (15 marks, 250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Demand decode: Use the 7.8% figure, but evaluate composition, employment and resilience.

Introduction: MoSPI estimates real GDP growth of 7.8% in Q1 FY 2026-27 under the new 2022-23 series. This signals strong macroeconomic momentum, but development quality depends on the structure and distribution of growth.

1. Why the number is encouraging

Strong activity in manufacturing, construction and services can generate production and investment linkages. Healthy consumption supports demand, while infrastructure and capital formation can crowd in private investment.

2. Why headline GDP is insufficient

GDP does not directly reveal job quality, real-wage growth, inequality, regional balance or ecological costs. A high-productivity sector can raise output rapidly without proportionate employment creation.

3. Resilience test

India remains exposed to imported crude, trade fragmentation and global financial conditions. Strong El Nino and below-normal September rainfall can affect agriculture, food inflation and rural demand.

4. Policy priorities

Crowd in private capex; strengthen MSME finance; improve logistics and skills; deepen manufacturing value chains; maintain macro stability; and publish/track jobs, productivity, real wages and per-capita outcomes with GDP.

Conclusion: The objective should be not merely fast growth, but employment-rich, productivity-led and shock-resilient growth.

Diagram: GDP growth -> composition -> jobs/productivity -> incomes -> inclusion -> resilience.

Q2. 'Cooperative federalism in water governance must move from political agreement to basin-level institutions.' Examine with reference to the Sone River water-sharing agreement. (15 marks, 250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Demand decode: Explain the federal significance of the agreement and the institutional conditions for durability.

Introduction: The Bihar-Jharkhand Sone MoU illustrates how negotiated federalism can resolve long-standing water issues without relying exclusively on adjudication.

1. Constitutional context

Water is primarily a State subject, while Union List Entry 56 and Article 262 recognise the inter-State character of river governance. The Inter-State River Water Disputes Act provides a tribunal route.

2. Why negotiated agreements help

They can create predictable irrigation/drinking-water allocations, reduce litigation, improve reservoir coordination and build inter-State trust.

3. Why an MoU alone is insufficient

Climate variability can change dependable flows; states may dispute discharge data; groundwater and surface water interact; floods and droughts require different operating rules; ecological flows may be neglected.

4. Way forward

Create a joint basin mechanism, shared telemetry, transparent seasonal formula, drought/flood contingencies, ecological-flow standards and periodic independent review.

Conclusion: Cooperative federalism becomes durable when common political intent is converted into common data, rules and institutions.

Diagram: Basin -> joint data -> allocation rules -> coordinated operations -> water security.

Q3. Electoral-roll revision must simultaneously protect the purity of the roll and the inclusion of every eligible citizen. Discuss. (15 marks, 250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Demand decode: Present both objectives as complementary and show why due process connects them.

Introduction: Electoral rolls are the administrative gateway to political participation. Inaccurate entries weaken roll integrity, while wrongful deletion directly affects democratic inclusion.

1. Need for revision

Deaths, migration, duplication and address changes require periodic updating. Article 324 gives the ECI constitutional responsibility, supported by the RPA 1950 and registration rules.

2. Inclusion risks

Documentation and notice requirements may burden migrants, elderly citizens, women with changed residence/name, homeless persons and other vulnerable groups.

3. Due-process standard

Deletion should have a recorded reason, reasonable notice, opportunity to respond, accessible correction/appeal and a transparent audit trail. Digital routes should coexist with physical assistance.

4. Way forward

Publish deletion categories and correction outcomes; strengthen multilingual help desks; provide assisted verification; conduct process audits; protect personal data; dispose of claims within fixed timelines.

Conclusion: Roll purity and inclusion are not competing values. A trustworthy electoral roll achieves both through transparent and reviewable procedure.

Diagram: Verification + notice + hearing + correction + audit = legitimate roll.
