1. Bihar-Jharkhand Sone River Water-Sharing Settlement

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: Federalism, inter-State relations | GS III: Water resources & irrigation

WHY IN NEWS

Bihar and Jharkhand signed an MoU to settle a 25-year-old dispute over Sone River water. The agreement allocates 5.75 MAF to Bihar and 2 MAF to Jharkhand and is a useful contemporary example of negotiated cooperative federalism.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

The Sone rises near Amarkantak and is a major right-bank tributary of the Ganga. Its basin spans central and eastern India. The dispute emerged after Jharkhand was carved out of Bihar in 2000 and involved allocation, reservoirs and irrigation projects.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Constitutional architecture: Entry 17, State List covers water subject to Union List Entry 56 on regulation and development of inter-State rivers. Article 262 empowers Parliament to provide for adjudication of inter-State river disputes. The Inter-State River Water Disputes Act, 1956 provides a tribunal framework, but negotiated agreements remain possible.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- Sone/Son → right-bank tributary of Ganga.
- Source region → Amarkantak plateau.
- Article 262 → inter-State river-water disputes.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

A settlement is significant because it shifts the focus from adjudicating entitlement to jointly managing a shared basin. It can also become a template for early political negotiation before disputes harden into prolonged litigation.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Hydrological data disputes; drought-year allocation; upstream-downstream asymmetry; ecological-flow neglect; groundwater-surface-water interaction; weak monitoring and absence of automatic review clauses.

WAY FORWARD

Create a permanent joint board; real-time telemetry; transparent basin dashboard; seasonal and distress-sharing formula; coordinated reservoir operation; ecological-flow safeguards; five-year climate-adjusted review.

2. Departmental Summit on Water Security: From Coverage to Sustainable Service

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: Cooperative federalism & governance | GS III: Water security

WHY IN NEWS

The Ministry of Jal Shakti convened the first Departmental Summit under a new Centre-State cooperative-federalism format. The 1–2 September summit focuses on timely water infrastructure, Jal Sanchay Jan Bhagidari, drinking-water source sustainability and Jal Jeevan Mission 2.0.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

India's water challenge is increasingly a service-delivery challenge: a tap connection is useful only when the source is reliable, water is safe, and operation & maintenance are financed. JJM 2.0 extends the mission to December 2028 and emphasises sustainability, digital monitoring and community ownership.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Key distinction: infrastructure coverage ≠ water security. Water security combines availability, quality, access, reliability, ecosystem sustainability and resilience. Cooperative federalism is essential because water is primarily a State subject while Union financing, technical standards and inter-State coordination remain important.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- JJM → rural household tap-water service delivery.
- Summit pillars: infrastructure, Catch the Rain/public participation, source sustainability, O&M; under JJM 2.0.
- Source sustainability means keeping the raw-water source viable over time.
- Avoid equating pipe creation with assured service.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Governance: departmental summits can convert broad federal consultation into time-bound sectoral action plans.

Fiscal: lifecycle O&M; needs predictable funding, not only capital grants.

Ecological: aquifer recharge, watershed protection and demand management must accompany extraction.

Local governance: Gram Panchayats/VWSCs need technical and financial capacity.

Digital: scheme-level monitoring can improve accountability but should not become target-only compliance.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

It represents a shift from “asset creation” to “service outcomes” and from fragmented schemes to convergence among drinking water, watershed, groundwater and local governance.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Fragmented departments; weak local capacity; non-revenue water; groundwater stress; source contamination; maintenance gaps; one-size-fits-all targets; climate extremes.

WAY FORWARD

Village water budgets; aquifer mapping; source-sustainability plans; service-level audits; lifecycle costing; convergence with watershed programmes; community-led monitoring; outcome-linked but flexible federal financing.

3. Maharashtra Electoral-Roll Revision: Inclusion, Accuracy and Due Process

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: Elections, Election Commission, RPA

WHY IN NEWS

A major revision of Maharashtra's electoral rolls triggered debate after a large number of names from the pre-revision roll did not appear in the draft. The Election Commission stressed that draft-stage omissions are not equivalent to final deletions because claims and objections remain open.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

Electoral rolls are dynamic legal registers. Revision removes deceased, duplicate, shifted or otherwise ineligible entries while adding newly eligible citizens. Urban migration, rental housing and address changes complicate roll maintenance.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Article 324 vests the superintendence, direction and control of elections in the Election Commission. The Representation of the People Act, 1950 substantially covers electoral rolls and allocation of seats; the 1951 Act substantially deals with conduct of elections, qualifications/disqualifications and election disputes.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- Article 324 → ECI.
- RPA 1950 → electoral rolls/allocation framework.
- RPA 1951 → conduct of elections/election disputes, among other matters.
- Draft roll is provisional; claims/objections are a due-process safeguard.
- Integrity requires preventing both wrongful inclusion and wrongful exclusion.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Democratic: wrongful exclusion directly impairs universal adult franchise; wrongful inclusion undermines confidence in roll accuracy.

Administrative: bulk data matching can create false positives unless field verification and reasoned decisions follow.

Equity: migrants, tenants, elderly and digitally excluded citizens may bear higher documentation/search costs.

Trust: transparency in categories of changes matters as much as aggregate numbers.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

A credible roll is foundational public infrastructure for democracy. The correct benchmark is not "maximum deletion" but maximum verified inclusion of eligible citizens with auditable removal of ineligible entries.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Documentation burdens; weak notice; digital exclusion; inconsistent booth-level implementation; duplicate-address complexities; politicisation; limited auditability.

WAY FORWARD

Proactive notice; booth-level assistance; online + physical search; reason-coded proposed exclusion; adequate objection window; statistical audits; public category-wise dashboards; accessible appellate remedies.

4. AFT Reinstates Agniveer: Military Discipline within Rule of Law

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: Tribunals, judiciary, rule of law | GS III: Defence personnel policy

WHY IN NEWS

The Armed Forces Tribunal set aside the discharge of an Agniveer over non-disclosure of a criminal case connected with an incident when he was a minor, ordering reinstatement. The dispute raised questions of disclosure, juvenile justice and compliance with earlier judicial protection.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

The Armed Forces Tribunal is a statutory specialised tribunal created by the Armed Forces Tribunal Act, 2007. It deals with service matters and appeals arising from court-martial decisions within its jurisdiction. Military administration requires discipline, but administrative power remains subject to law and judicial orders.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Rule-of-law principle: specialised institutions do not operate outside constitutional legality. **Proportionality:** adverse action should bear a rational and proportionate relationship to misconduct. **Juvenile justice:** the legal system emphasises rehabilitation and limits lifelong stigma for acts committed as a child.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- AFT → Armed Forces Tribunal Act, 2007.
- Distinguish AFT from a court martial.
- Military discipline does not nullify judicial review/rule of law.
- Juvenile-justice protections are rehabilitation-oriented.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Institutional discipline: forces legitimately demand candour and high conduct standards.

Fair administration: recruitment forms must clearly state legally relevant disclosure obligations.

Judicial hierarchy: executive authorities must correctly implement binding court directions.

Human-resource governance: disproportionate exclusion can waste trained manpower and conflict with rehabilitative law.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

The case is useful for GS-II because it illustrates how national-security institutions reconcile operational discipline with constitutional administrative law.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Legally vetted disclosure forms; explicit juvenile-record guidance; reasoned speaking orders; proportionality review; compliance cells for judicial directions; time-bound grievance redress.

5. Strait of Hormuz: West Asia Tensions and India's Energy-Security Exposure

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: International Relations | GS III: Energy security & external sector

WHY IN NEWS

Renewed US-Iran tensions have again placed the Strait of Hormuz at the centre of global energy-security calculations. Even without a complete physical closure, risk perception can raise freight, insurance and crude/LNG costs.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

Hormuz is the narrow maritime passage between Iran and Oman connecting the Persian Gulf with the Gulf of Oman and Arabian Sea. Major Gulf hydrocarbon exporters depend heavily on this route. India's vulnerability arises from import dependence, shipping exposure and a large diaspora in West Asia.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Energy security has four dimensions: **availability, affordability, accessibility and acceptability/sustainability**. Maritime chokepoints convert geopolitical risk into economic risk through price, freight, insurance and delivery uncertainty.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- Hormuz: Persian Gulf ↔ Gulf of Oman.
- Iran lies north; Oman/Musandam to south.
- Do not confuse with Bab-el-Mandeb (Red Sea–Gulf of Aden) or Malacca.
- Chokepoint disruption can affect prices even before physical supply stops.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Macro-economy: higher oil can widen trade/current-account deficit, weaken rupee and add inflation.

Diplomacy: India must balance Gulf partners, Iran, US ties and strategic autonomy.

Security: naval presence, maritime-domain awareness and seafarer protection matter.

Transition: renewable energy and efficiency are also geopolitical-risk hedges.

Diaspora: evacuation and remittance continuity are additional concerns.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

Hormuz demonstrates that energy security is not simply "buying oil from many countries"; route diversification, reserves, refining flexibility and diplomacy are equally important.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Limited bypass capacity; war-risk insurance; tanker availability; SPR size/rotation; simultaneous shipping chokepoint shocks; diplomatic constraints.

WAY FORWARD

Diversify suppliers/routes; strengthen strategic petroleum reserves; flexible refinery sourcing; maritime surveillance; emergency shipping/insurance protocols; renewables/EV/efficiency; sustained de-escalatory diplomacy.

6. Kavach 4.0: Scaling Indigenous Automatic Train Protection

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS III: Infrastructure, Railways, Science & Technology

WHY IN NEWS

Indian Railways approved ₹170 crore for Kavach Version 4.0 across the remaining 712 route-km of Moradabad Division, Northern Railway. The project extends an indigenous safety-critical train-protection system.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

Kavach is an Automatic Train Protection (ATP) system. It assists the loco pilot by enforcing safe operation, including automatic braking in defined unsafe conditions such as Signal Passing at Danger and overspeed situations.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

A safety-critical ATP architecture combines onboard equipment, trackside/signalling inputs, communication links and fail-safe braking logic. **Route-km** measures route length and differs from track-km where multiple tracks may run on the same route.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- Kavach = indigenous ATP, not a generic signalling replacement.
- Helps prevent SPAD and controls unsafe speed through automatic intervention.
- 712 route-km, Moradabad Division, Northern Railway; approved cost ₹170 crore.
- Route-km ≠ track-km.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Safety: reduces dependence on human reaction alone.

Atmanirbhar Bharat: domestic safety-critical capability can reduce technology dependence.

Industrial: scaling requires vendor capacity, testing and standardisation.

Cyber: connected signalling demands cybersecurity and redundancy.

Systems view: ATP complements—not replaces—track renewal, signalling discipline, staffing and maintenance culture.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

Kavach is a strong example of indigenisation where the policy objective is not only manufacturing but dependable certification and lifecycle maintenance of safety-critical technology.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Interoperability; rollout speed; radio reliability; cybersecurity; vendor bottlenecks; maintenance skills; independent safety validation; legacy signalling integration.

WAY FORWARD

Risk-ranked corridors first; independent certification; fail-safe redundancy; cybersecurity testing; maintenance cadre; transparent reliability metrics; integrate with signalling/track modernisation.

7. DGFT Automated Free Sale & Commerce Certificates: Risk-Based Digital Regulation

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS II: E-governance | GS III: External trade & ease of doing business

WHY IN NEWS

DGFT enabled automated issuance of eligible Free Sale and Commerce Certificates (FSCs), while retaining scrutiny for cases that trigger risk or verification requirements.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

FSCs can be requested by importing jurisdictions as evidence that specified products are freely sold/traded in the exporting country. The reform uses straight-through processing for routine low-risk applications and exception-based scrutiny for flagged cases.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Risk-based regulation allocates regulatory attention according to assessed risk rather than treating every transaction identically. The model can lower compliance time while preserving scrutiny where needed. DGFT functions under the Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce & Industry.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- DGFT → Department of Commerce.
- DGFT is distinct from CBIC/customs assessment.
- Automation does not mean absence of regulation; high-risk cases can be scrutinised.
- FSC is a trade facilitation/certification instrument.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Ease of doing business: faster routine approvals lower transaction costs.

Integrity: reduced discretionary touchpoints can curb rent-seeking.

State capacity: officials can focus on high-risk exceptions.

Digital rights: automated flags need explainability, audit trails and human review.

Trade: predictable certification can improve export responsiveness.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

This is a useful governance example of “minimum necessary human intervention” rather than deregulation—automation can strengthen regulation if auditability and appeal are built in.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Opaque risk parameters; false positives; cybersecurity; poor data quality; interoperability gaps; exclusion of firms with weak digital capacity.

WAY FORWARD

Service standards; reasoned exception notices; human appeal; periodic algorithm audits; secure APIs; interoperable single-window systems; publish turnaround/error metrics.

8. Sugar Stock-Holding Limits: Inflation Control versus Market Predictability

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS III: Food management, inflation, agriculture & market regulation

WHY IN NEWS

The Union Government reduced the sugar stock-holding limit for dealers to 2,000 quintals from 15 September for a specified period, as part of measures aimed at adequate market availability and price stability.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

Stock limits seek to discourage excessive inventory accumulation/hoarding and release supplies into the market. Sugar policy is unusually interconnected: sugarcane pricing, mill liquidity, domestic stocks, exports and ethanol diversion influence one another.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

Stock limits are **market-regulation tools**; they are different from MSP, public procurement and buffer-stock release. Their effectiveness depends on whether a price spike reflects hoarding, genuine shortage, logistics or expectations.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- Stock limit $\neq$ MSP.
- Stock limit $\neq$ buffer procurement.
- Sugar is linked to ethanol policy through permitted feedstock diversion.
- Temporary controls need clear period/sunset conditions.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Inflation: can moderate speculative stocking in the short run.
Business: frequent ad-hoc limits can disrupt legitimate inventory and contracts.
Farmers: sugar-market stress can transmit to cane-payment arrears.
Energy: ethanol diversion creates a food-fuel-policy linkage.
Governance: real-time stock data improves calibration.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

The measure highlights the policy trade-off between rapid consumer-price intervention and the need for predictable agricultural-market rules.

Misdiagnosing shortage; compliance burden; regulatory uncertainty; regional inventory needs; leakage; conflict with export/ethanol decisions.

9. Onion Buffer & “Kanda Express”: Logistics as Price-Stabilisation Policy

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS III: Food inflation, agricultural marketing, storage & logistics

WHY IN NEWS

The Government expanded calibrated release of onion buffer stocks through rail rakes branded “Kanda Express” and road transport, using cooperative channels to move onions towards consuming centres.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

Onion prices are volatile because production is seasonal and geographically concentrated, the commodity is perishable, storage losses can be high and weather shocks quickly affect arrivals. Buffer procurement under the Price Stabilisation Fund allows releases during seasonal tightness.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

A buffer works as a **shock absorber**: procure in periods of adequate supply, store scientifically and release when scarcity/price spikes emerge. Logistics determines whether the buffer reaches deficit markets before quality deteriorates.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- NAFED → agricultural cooperative marketing federation.
- NCCF → consumer cooperative federation.
- Onion price-stabilisation buffer differs from central foodgrain stocks for food-security operations.
- Rail can improve bulk inter-regional movement.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Consumer: targeted releases can moderate temporary spikes.

Farmer: procurement can support prices if calibrated well.

Logistics: rail-road multimodal movement improves spatial arbitrage.

Storage: poor curing/ventilation can destroy the buffer itself.

Structural: repeated emergency intervention signals inadequate storage, forecasting or processing.

WHY THIS MATTERS / SIGNIFICANCE

The policy shows that inflation management can be a supply-chain problem rather than only a monetary-policy problem.

ISSUES & CHALLENGES

Storage wastage; procurement timing; release transparency; local market power; crop forecast errors; regional mismatch; risk of suppressing farmer prices.

WAY FORWARD

10. IMD September Outlook: Below-Normal Rainfall under Strong El Niño

UPSC SYLLABUS & PYQ RELEVANCE

GS I: Climatology & monsoon | GS III: Agriculture, water & disaster management

WHY IN NEWS

IMD's September 2026 outlook assessed all-India monthly rainfall as most likely below normal. Strong El Niño conditions prevailed, while the forecast also indicated spatial variation: some parts of northwest, northeast, east, east-central and southeast peninsular India could receive normal to above-normal rainfall.

CONTEXT & BACKGROUND

September is the final month of the southwest monsoon and matters for standing kharif crops, soil moisture and reservoir carryover. El Niño is anomalous warming in the central/eastern equatorial Pacific associated with changes in the Walker circulation.

CONCEPT EXPLAINED

ENSO-monsoon linkage is **probabilistic, not deterministic**. IOD, intra-seasonal oscillations and regional circulation can modify outcomes. National averages can hide simultaneous district-level drought and flood risk.

PRELIMS FACT ZONE + TRAPS

- ENSO → tropical Pacific.
- El Niño often weakens Indian monsoon, but not invariably.
- LPA = Long Period Average.
- IMD September outlook: all-India rainfall most likely below normal.
- Positive IOD may support monsoon conditions but does not mechanically cancel El Niño.

MAINS — MULTIDIMENSIONAL ANALYSIS

Forecast uncertainty; spatial averaging; irrigation inequity; weak last-mile advisories; reservoir coordination; compound heat-drought risk.

WAY FORWARD

District crop-contingency plans; micro/protective irrigation; reservoir coordination; fodder/seed reserves; insurance readiness; agro-met advisories; communicate probabilities, not certainties.

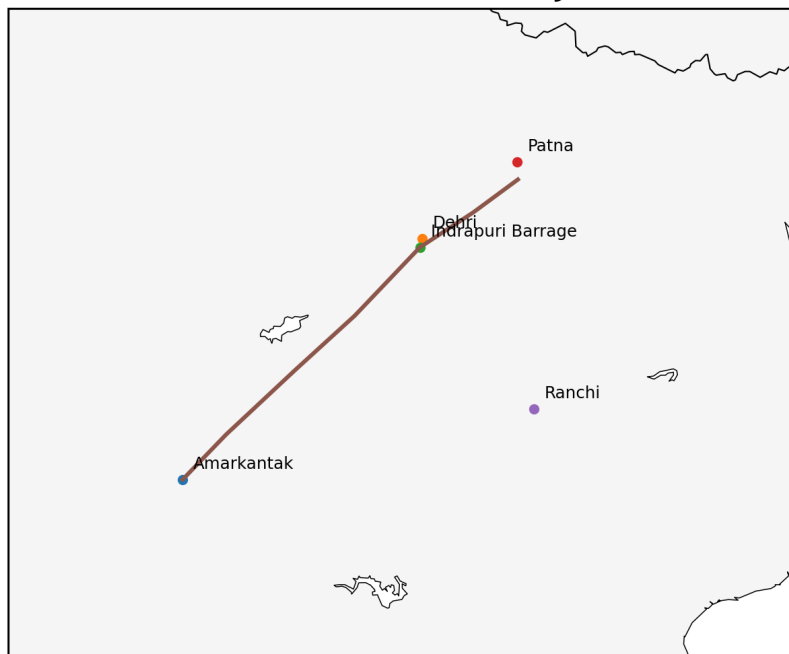

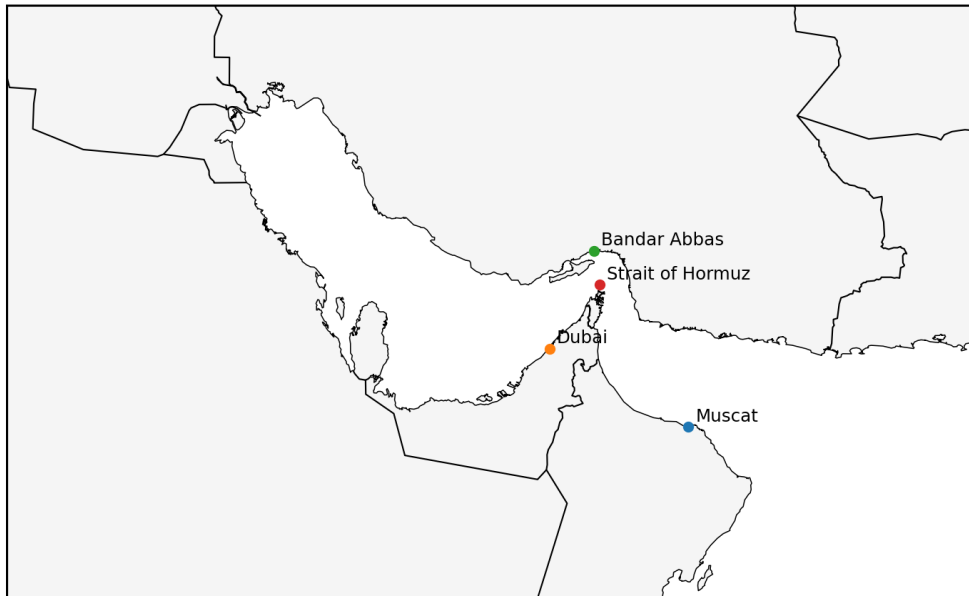

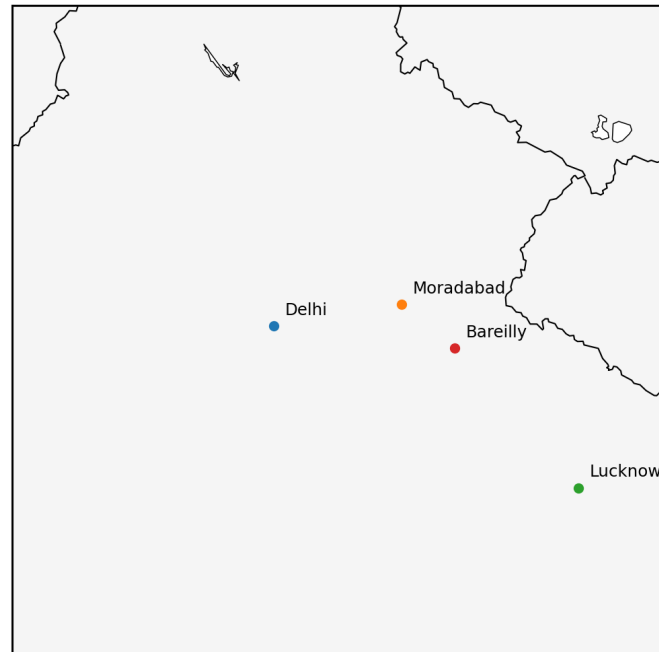

3 MAINS QUESTIONS — EXAM-READY MODEL ANSWERS

Q1. “Cooperative federalism in water governance must move beyond allocation disputes towards joint basin management.” Discuss. (250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Introduction: Rivers follow hydrological basins while governmental authority follows political boundaries. This structural mismatch makes inter-State water governance a recurring test of Indian federalism.

Constitutional-institutional context: Water is primarily a State subject, subject to Union List Entry 56, while Article 262 enables Parliament to provide for adjudication of inter-State river disputes. Yet adjudication alone cannot manage a dynamic basin.

Why joint basin management is necessary: (1) climate variability alters dependable flows; (2) upstream land use affects downstream runoff and sediment; (3) reservoirs influence irrigation, floods and drought simultaneously; (4) groundwater extraction changes surface-water dependence; and (5) ecological flows cannot be protected through state-wise quotas alone. The Bihar-Jharkhand Sone settlement demonstrates the value of political negotiation, but its durability will depend on common data, seasonal operating rules, distress-sharing and monitoring.

Way forward: permanent joint institutions, real-time telemetry, public hydrological dashboards, reservoir coordination, ecological-flow norms, pre-agreed drought formulas and periodic climate-adjusted review. Technical bodies should support—not replace—political accountability.

Conclusion: Cooperative federalism matures when States stop viewing river water as a fixed divisible asset and begin treating the basin as a shared, variable ecological system.

Q2. Electoral-roll integrity requires simultaneous protection against wrongful inclusion and wrongful exclusion. Examine. (250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Introduction: Universal adult franchise is meaningful only when electoral rolls are both accurate and inclusive. Therefore roll integrity has two symmetrical risks: an ineligible name retained and an eligible citizen excluded.

Need for revision: Death, migration, duplicate registration, address change and newly eligible voters make periodic revision unavoidable. Article 324 places constitutional responsibility for election superintendence with the Election Commission, while the RPA 1950 provides the principal statutory framework for electoral rolls.

Risk of wrongful exclusion: bulk data matching, weak notice, documentation burdens and digital-search failures can disproportionately affect migrants, tenants, elderly persons and weaker groups. Exclusion directly denies the vote. **Risk of wrongful inclusion:** duplicates, deceased or shifted entries reduce confidence in the register and can fuel allegations about electoral integrity.

Due-process solution: draft publication must be followed by accessible claims and objections, proactive individual notice, booth-level assistance, reasoned orders, searchable online and physical rolls and adequate correction time. Category-wise public reporting and statistical audits can improve trust without exposing personal data.

Conclusion: The objective is neither maximum deletion nor maximum retention; it is maximum verified inclusion of every eligible elector and removal only through fair, reviewable procedure.



Q3. Food-price stabilisation should use emergency interventions as shock absorbers, not substitutes for structural agricultural reform. Discuss. (250 words)

MODEL ANSWER

Introduction: Food inflation arises from production shocks, perishability, storage, logistics, market power and expectations. Consequently, temporary administrative measures cannot by themselves create durable price stability.

Role of emergency tools: Sugar stock limits can discourage excessive inventory accumulation when speculative stocking contributes to price pressure. Onion-buffer releases through NAFED/NCCF and Kanda Express can quickly move stocks towards deficit markets. These measures can cushion short-lived shocks and protect consumers.

Limitations: poorly calibrated stock limits may penalise legitimate inventory and create regulatory uncertainty. Buffer operations can suffer procurement errors and storage wastage. Repeated intervention can suppress farmer incentives if releases are mistimed. Onion volatility reflects seasonal concentration and inadequate scientific storage, while sugar is linked to cane pricing, mill liquidity, exports and ethanol diversion.

Structural agenda: scientific storage, crop/arrival forecasting, processing and dehydration, FPO aggregation, multimodal logistics, competition enforcement, predictable trade and ethanol policy, and transparent real-time stock data. Emergency interventions should have rule-based triggers and sunset clauses.

Conclusion: Buffers and stock limits should absorb temporary shocks; resilient value chains, better information and predictable policy must carry the burden of long-term food-price stability.
