1. SUPREME COURT ON UPI MDR: PRICING DIGITAL PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE

WHY IN NEWS

The Supreme Court refused to stay the Centre's decision permitting a 0.4% Merchant Discount Rate (MDR) on person-to-merchant Unified Payments Interface (UPI) transactions above Rs 2,000, effective 15 October.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

UPI is an interoperable instant-payment system operated by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI). MDR is the fee associated with merchant acceptance of digital payments; it is distinct from a charge automatically imposed on every customer.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

The policy reopens a core Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) question: who should bear recurring costs of switching, fraud control, cybersecurity, grievance redress and innovation? Zero-price access helped UPI scale rapidly, but persistent zero pricing can weaken commercial incentives for banks and payment providers.

KEY POINTS FOR UPSC

- A mature digital-payments system must balance affordability, universal access, competition and sustainable cost recovery.

ISSUES / CHALLENGES

- Small merchants may face disproportionate cost pressure.
- Dominant apps can capture a larger share of new revenue because of network effects.

2. US DIESEL EXPORT CURBS: ENERGY SECURITY BEYOND CRUDE OIL

WHY IN NEWS

A proposed US curb on diesel exports has unsettled an already tight global refined-fuel market amid West Asian conflict and disruptions to traditional energy flows.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Energy security has three dimensions: availability, affordability and reliability. Refined-product markets can tighten even when global crude supply is adequate because refining capacity, product specifications, shipping routes and inventories matter.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

Diesel is central to freight, agriculture, construction and backup power. A supply shock can raise refining margins and transport costs globally. India is both a major crude importer and an important refining/export hub, so effects can differ between domestic consumers, refiners and the external account.

KEY POINTS FOR UPSC

- The diesel episode shows that downstream refining and trade concentration can become a strategic vulnerability even without a crude-oil shortage.

ISSUES / CHALLENGES

- Fuel-price shocks can transmit into food and core inflation.

WHY IN NEWS

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar and Canadian Foreign Minister Anita Anand signalled efforts to take ties to a higher level, with trade and a possible Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) returning to focus.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

India-Canada relations span trade, investment, education, technology, critical minerals, agriculture and a large Indian-origin diaspora. Political tensions have recently constrained this economic complementarity.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

A durable reset requires separating legitimate security concerns from mutually beneficial functional cooperation. Canada offers critical minerals, capital, universities and technology; India offers a large market, talent and manufacturing/service opportunities. A CEPA can reduce tariff and non-tariff barriers, but trust is a precondition for ambitious economic integration.

4. POOMPUHAR UNDERWATER EXCAVATIONS: SANGAM PORTS AND INDIAN OCEAN TRADE

WHY IN NEWS

Fresh underwater exploration off Poompuhar recovered a fragment of a West Asian torpedo jar, four terracotta ring wells and over 250 ceramic fragments, adding evidence of long-distance maritime links.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Poompuhar or Kaveripoompattinam lies near the mouth of the Cauvery in present-day Mayiladuthurai district, Tamil Nadu. It figures prominently in Sangam and post-Sangam literature and is associated with the early Cholas.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

The find matters because artefacts can independently test literary descriptions of maritime exchange. Torpedo jars were used in West Asian maritime trade for liquid cargo. Ring wells indicate urban water/drainage practices. Coastal geomorphology and sea-level change also explain why parts of ancient settlements may now lie offshore.

WHY IN NEWS

India showcased forest and landscape restoration initiatives at the 28th Session of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) Committee on Forestry (COFO 28) in Rome, held from 28 September to 2 October.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Landscape restoration goes beyond planting trees. It seeks recovery of ecological functions, biodiversity, soil, water and livelihoods across mosaics of forests, farms, grasslands and settlements.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

India emphasised country-driven implementation, capacity development, technology transfer and measurable outcomes. This framing is important because restoration targets can become misleading if judged only by area planted rather than survival, native diversity, ecosystem function and community rights.

KEY POINTS FOR UPSC

- The relevant metric is ecological recovery and resilience, not the number of saplings planted.

ISSUES / CHALLENGES

- Monoculture plantations may not recreate natural forests.

WHY IN NEWS

An investigation into alleged wildlife offences has expanded to an alleged elephant purchase and movement from Nepal, highlighting cross-border trafficking and accountability in wildlife conservation.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Wildlife trafficking is a transnational organised-crime problem involving source areas, transport corridors, forged documents, captive-animal laundering and destination markets. India addresses it through the Wildlife (Protection) Act and specialised enforcement institutions.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

The Wildlife Crime Control Bureau (WCCB) is a statutory multidisciplinary body under the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change. CITES regulates international trade in listed wild species through appendices and permit systems; it does not simply ban all wildlife trade.

WHY IN NEWS

A current policy debate contrasts rapid utility-scale solar expansion with slower decentralised rooftop and farm-solar deployment under PM Surya Ghar and PM-KUSUM.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Utility-scale solar gains economies of scale, while Distributed Energy Resources (DERs) such as rooftop solar and storage can reduce distribution losses, improve resilience and democratise ownership.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

Indian Express noted solar capacity of about 168 GW by August 2026, with roughly three-fourths utility-scale. PM Surya Ghar targets rooftop solar for one crore households; PM-KUSUM promotes decentralised solar and solar pumps for farmers. WHY IN NEWS

Indian startup TakeMe2Space plans to launch the sub-50 kg MOI-1A satellite on 1 October, describing it as India's first orbital computing satellite capable of processing data in orbit.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

Traditional Earth-observation satellites often downlink raw data for terrestrial processing. Edge computing moves computation closer to the data source, allowing filtering, compression or AI inference before transmission.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

On-orbit processing can reduce downlink bandwidth, latency and ground-station costs, especially for large imagery datasets. Potential applications include agriculture, mining, disaster response, supply chains and insurance. It also creates new cybersecurity and space-data-governance questions.

KEY POINTS FOR UPSC

- The strategic value of space is shifting from owning satellites to controlling the data-compute-service chain.

ISSUES / CHALLENGES

- Radiation and thermal constraints affect processors.

Mental health is shaped by social determinants: family conditions, education, employment, housing, discrimination, climate stress and access to care. Prevention therefore extends beyond hospitals.

10. RUPEE, BONDS AND WEST ASIAN OIL RISK

WHY IN NEWS

Reuters reported that the rupee and government bonds remain vulnerable to high oil prices as hopes for Iran-related diplomacy weaken, keeping India exposed to imported energy costs.

BACKGROUND / STATIC LINK

For a net oil importer, higher crude prices can widen the trade/current-account deficit, increase dollar demand, weaken the currency and raise imported inflation. Bond yields can rise if markets expect higher inflation or government borrowing pressure.

KEY FACTS & DETAILED ANALYSIS

The same shock can hit multiple markets: oil raises import costs; rupee depreciation further increases landed prices; inflation expectations affect interest rates; foreign portfolio flows can respond to yield and currency risk. RBI foreign-exchange intervention can smooth disorderly moves but cannot permanently offset fundamentals.

KEY POINTS FOR UPSC

- Macroeconomic resilience depends more on lower structural energy dependence and credible policy than on defending a particular exchange-rate number.

- Dissent can reduce groupthink and protect institutional credibility, especially where decisions affect political equality or vulnerable citizens.
- However, constant personalised dissent can also weaken collective responsibility. The ethical standard is principled disagreement followed by transparent institutional procedure.

WAY FORWARD

- Protect reasoned dissent.
- Record material objections and responses.
- Use speaking orders and audit trails.
- Protect whistle-blowers acting in public interest.
- Train civil servants in constitutional morality and empathy.

SOLARISING INDIA: SCALE VERSUS DISTRIBUTED OWNERSHIP

- Utility-scale solar has delivered rapid capacity at low cost, but distributed solar can democratise ownership, reduce losses and generate rural income.
- The main tension is not either-or: large parks need land and transmission, while rooftop/farm solar needs finance, DISCOM cooperation and local maintenance.
- Solar pumps must be coupled with groundwater governance; otherwise clean energy can unintentionally accelerate aquifer depletion.

WAY FORWARD

- Scale storage and grid flexibility.
- Simplify rooftop finance and metering.
- Promote farmer solar cooperatives.
- Link pump incentives to water budgets.
- Localise the full manufacturing chain.

DIGITAL PAYMENTS: FREE PUBLIC GOOD OR PRICED NETWORK?

- UPI creates large positive externalities through formalisation and convenience, supporting a case for public subsidy.
- But banks and payment providers incur recurring costs, supporting some form of transparent cost recovery.
- A differentiated MDR can be more equitable than either universal zero pricing or a uniform fee.

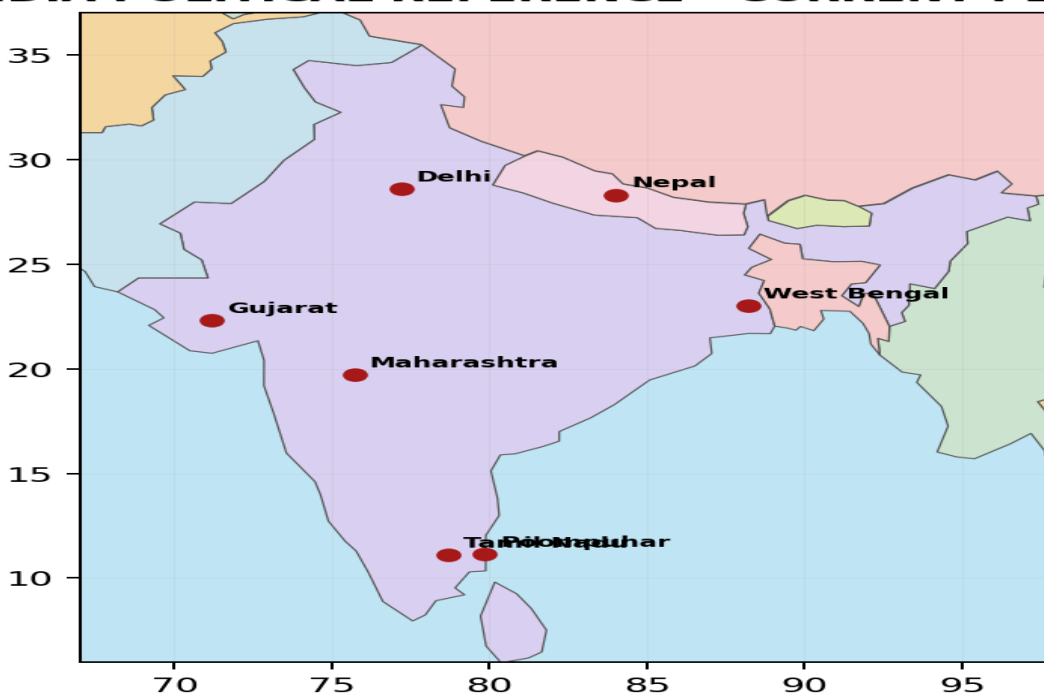

INDIA POLITICAL REFERENCE - CURRENT PLACES

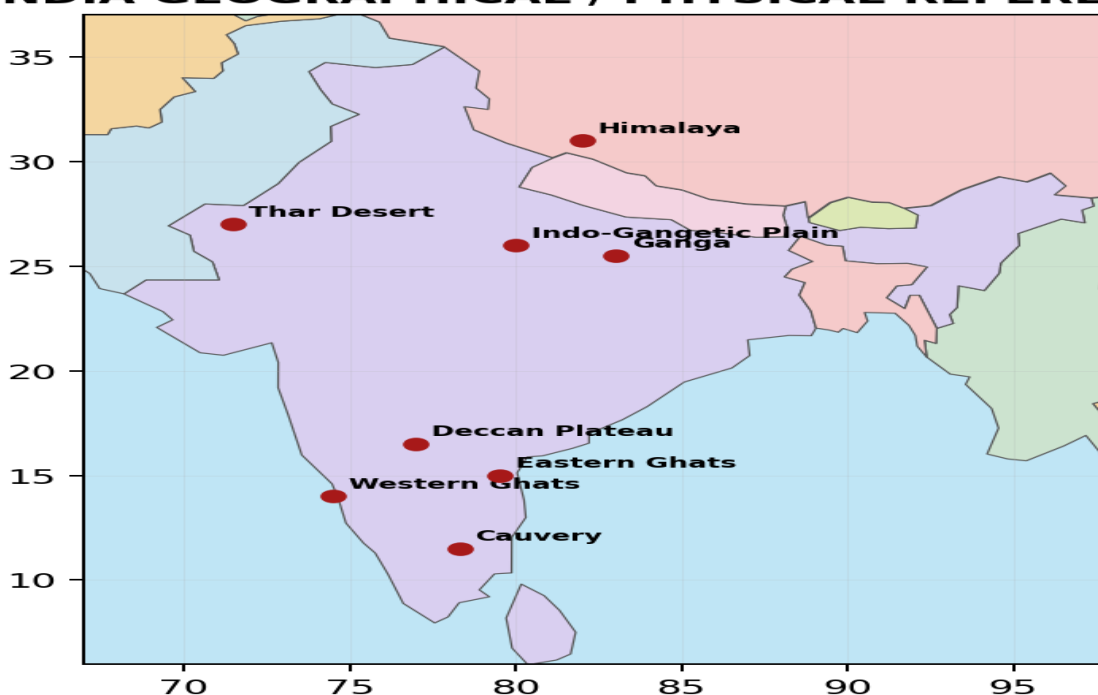

INDIA GEOGRAPHICAL / PHYSICAL REFERENCE



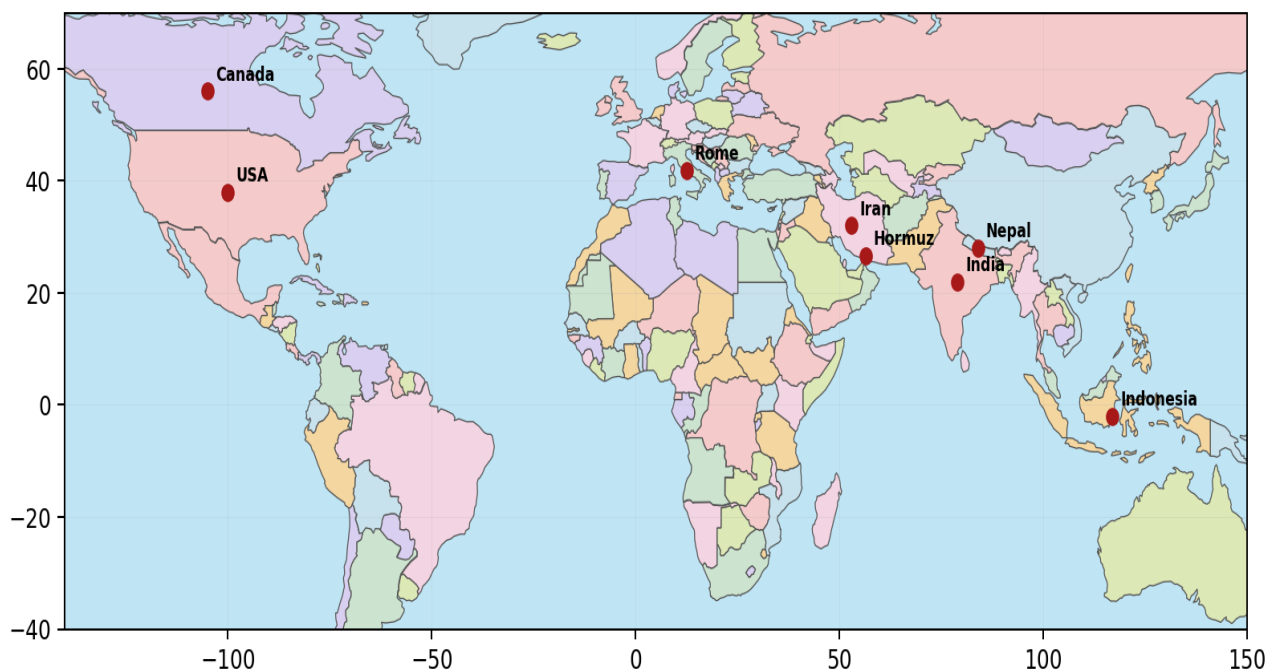

ANSWER: (a)

• Statements 1 and 2 are correct. MDR is a payment-acceptance fee framework and NPCI operates UPI. Statement 3 is incorrect: there is no constitutional rule mandating zero pricing for every UPI transaction. UPSC trap: do not confuse a government pricing policy with a constitutional right.

Q2. Poompuhar, Korkai and Muchiri/Muziris in ancient Indian history are best known as:

ANSWER: (b)

• They were important ancient maritime ports. Poompuhar was associated with the Cholas and the Cauvery mouth; Korkai with the Pandya region; Muchiri/Muziris with the west coast. Why others are wrong: they were neither Buddhist universities nor Mauryan capitals, and their defining historical role was maritime trade, not iron production.

Q3. Which statement about CITES is correct?

- (b) It regulates international trade in listed species through different levels of protection
- (c) It is an Indian statutory body
- (d) It applies only to marine species

ANSWER: (b)

• CITES is an international agreement that regulates trade so it does not threaten species survival. Its appendices provide different degrees of control. It does not ban all wildlife trade and is not an Indian agency. UPSC trap: WCCB is the Indian statutory enforcement body; CITES is the international convention.

Q4. Landscape restoration differs from simple tree planting because it primarily seeks to:

ANSWER: (b)

UPSC trap: depreciation is a market movement; devaluation is an official parity change under a fixed/managed regime.

ANSWER: (b)

- A Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement is broader than a narrow goods-only tariff arrangement and can cover services, investment and regulatory cooperation. UPSC trap: names vary across agreements, so read the actual scope rather than assuming all CEPAs are identical.

ANSWER: (a)

- COFO is FAO's Committee on Forestry. FAO is a UN specialised agency dealing with food and agriculture broadly, including forestry and fisheries. UPSC trap: distinguish UN specialised agencies from Indian statutory/constitutional bodies.

The recent underwater finds at Poompuhar, including a West Asian torpedo-jar fragment, ring wells and ceramics, are important because they allow literary descriptions of Sangam-age maritime life to be tested against material evidence. Poompuhar, or Kaveripoompattinam, stood near the Cauvery mouth and was closely associated with the early Cholas.

MULTIDIMENSIONAL BODY

MARITIME GEOGRAPHY

Its river-mouth location connected the fertile Cauvery hinterland to the Bay of Bengal. Monsoon winds and coastal navigation linked Tamil ports with Sri Lanka, Southeast Asia and western Indian Ocean networks.

LITERATURE AND ARCHAEOLOGY

Sangam and post-Sangam texts portray busy ports and merchant communities. Archaeological finds provide an independent evidentiary layer and help distinguish literary memory from historical reconstruction.

LONG-DISTANCE TRADE

A West Asian torpedo jar suggests movement of liquid cargo and commercial links beyond South Asia. Ceramics can reveal origin, chronology and exchange networks.

URBAN CHARACTER

Ring wells, craft debris and imported ceramics point to dense settlement, water management, specialised occupations and consumption by an urban population.

CULTURAL EXCHANGE

Ports transmitted not only goods but technologies, artistic forms, beliefs, languages and migrant communities, making coastal cities cosmopolitan interfaces.

CRITICAL ANALYSIS

Material finds must be dated and contextualised carefully: one imported object does not prove the scale of trade, and submerged deposits may have been moved by coastal processes. Hence archaeology, literature, geomorphology and scientific dating must be combined.

WAY FORWARD

- Create a national underwater-cultural-heritage mission.
- Use multibeam sonar and sub-bottom profiling before excavation.
- Develop conservation labs for submerged artefacts.
- Integrate archaeology with palaeo-shoreline reconstruction.
- Digitise finds and publish open research datasets.

CONCLUSION

Poompuhar therefore demonstrates that ancient South India was not peripheral to global exchange. Its river, coast and urban institutions placed it within an interconnected Indian Ocean economy whose material traces continue to reshape historical understanding.

Banks and payment firms incur switching, server, compliance, dispute-resolution and fraud costs. Persistent zero pricing can weaken incentives to invest.
